Bartholomew elected Chairwoman; Thomson, Valot join OWB/OWA as directors

Valot has been in the wine industry 15 years in Argentina and Oregon. At Silvan Ridge, he has served as winemaker and vineyard manager and has taught classes at Chemeketa Community College in Salem. He was named winemaker at Silvan Ridge in 2012 in his seventh year at the South Willamette Valley winery.
